

Alex Brockwehl has worked for nearly fifteen years in various roles across the federal government and non-profit sector, with a focus on U.S. foreign policy toward Latin America and the Caribbean. Currently, he is a [Visiting Researcher at Brookings](#), where he writes on migration and Western Hemisphere policy. He also serves as [Policy Director at the Leadership Now Project](#)—a nationwide coalition of 400 business leaders committed to protecting U.S. democracy as a foundation for a thriving economy.



From 2024-2025, Alex served as Director for Migration Cooperation at the White House National Security Council, coordinating a strategy across various federal government agencies and with 21 partner countries to respond to historic levels of migration throughout the Western Hemisphere. Before that, he served as Senior Advisor for Latin America and the Caribbean at USAID, advising agency leadership on U.S. foreign assistance toward the region. From 2019-2022, he served as Democratic Staff Director of the House Foreign Affairs Western Hemisphere Subcommittee, advising Democratic members on U.S. policy toward Latin America and the Caribbean and authoring bipartisan legislation on Central America, Mexico, Colombia, Venezuela, and Cuba. During that time, he also drove the work of the bipartisan Colombia caucus and was lead staffer for a number of bipartisan Codels focused on U.S. policy toward Colombia and Venezuela.

From 2018-2019, Alex was a Foreign Policy and Defense Fellow for Senator Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV), drafting provisions to reform privatized military housing that were included in the National Defense Authorization Act and advising the Senator on U.S. policy toward China, Russia, and the Middle East. In 2017, he worked at the Department of State, advising the Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassy in Honduras and providing diplomatic reporting on local economic and political developments.

Prior to his government service, Alex was a Senior Program Officer for Latin America at Freedom House and consulted for the National Democratic Institute and International Rescue Committee. From 2016-2019, he served as a non-resident Latin America expert for Freedom House, drafting the Venezuela, Honduras, and Peru country reports for the *Freedom in the World* and *Freedom of the Press* indices.

Alex received a Master in Public Affairs degree from Princeton University and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Union College. He is a term member with the Council on Foreign Affairs.
